ASHNR: Setting up for a BREAK OUT Year

The ASHNR 42nd Annual Meeting was recently held in Toronto on September 10-14, 2008. We attracted 391 registrants, (144 members, 159 non-members and 88 Residents/ Fellows). There were 26 high-quality scientific papers, divided into 3 sessions, and a very impressive 66 educational exhibits (posters). These academic efforts reflect an increasing interest and involvement in head and neck research by residents/fellows and younger members, including faculty.

Our program success and registration numbers reflect the progressive capabilities of those leaders who have passed before me, each having organized outstanding meetings, and making my task so much the easier. If I limit myself to the 5 past annual meetings, observing the efforts of Drs. Pat Hudgins, Vijay Rao, Roy Holliday, Ric Harnsberger and Tim Larson offered invaluable lessons on how to run a meeting and assisted me greatly.

Helped by a very supportive ASHNR Executive Committee, an enthusiastic and talented Program Committee, an outstanding Education Committee, headed by Dr. Michelle Michel, the champion of efficiency, ideas and organization, and an unbelievably talented and unselfish faculty, whom I cannot adequately thank for giving of their own time (and expense) to prepare and present requested topics for this meeting, I will highlight some initiatives we were able to offer to this year's program, including an additional 5 hours of CME for a total of 33.25 hours (and with no increase in the registration rate since the 39th Annual Meeting in 2005).

We had 125 pre-registrants for an "unofficial" hugely successful *Early Bird Temporal Bone Study Club*, with more than 160 attendees, and so capably moderated by Drs. Ric Harnsberger, Joel Swartz and Susan Blaser. We offered a *Case of the Day*

(posted the previous day), with book prizes donated by Amirsys, Inc.. While maintaining the Stump the Experts session, to demonstrate how those more experienced approach challenging cases, Drs. Richard Wiggins and Douglas Phillips brilliantly programmed this into a very enjoyable "Jeopardy" format. We offered more panel sessions and continued with multiple audience response system case review sessions to increase attendee participation and the opportunity for attendees to confidentially assess their knowledge following a specific presentations. set of Prominent members assigned to moderate the scientific paper sessions presented 2-minute "pearls" of diagnostic, technical or clinical research importance. The introduction of these "pearls," and Peter Som's outstanding Gold Medal lecture, merging advancing knowledge of the pathophysiology of inflammatory and neoplastic

American Society of Head and Neck Radiology 2008 Gold Medal Recipient

The American Society of Head and Neck Radiology (ASHNR) presented its 2008 Gold Medal to Dr. William P. Dillon on September 11, 2008, during the ASHNR 42nd Annual Meeting at the Hilton Toronto Hotel in Toronto, Ontario, Canada.

Dr. William Dillon attended medical school at UCLA and then performed an internship at Virginia Mason Medical Center in Seattle, Washington. He completed his radiology residency at the University of Utah in Salt Lake City. In his last year of residency, Dr. Dillon was inspired to learn more about imaging of the head and neck by Dr. Anthony A. Mancuso. Dr. Dillon's passion for the field of Head & Neck Radiology had begun. He performed his neuroradiology fellowship at UCSF Medical Center in San Francisco, California under the tutelage of the radiology giants, Drs. Margulis, Newton and Norman.

Following his fellowship, Dr. Dillon joined the UCSF Neuroradiology faculty. His storied career spans the spectrum from clinical expertise and research to teaching and administrative accomplishments. He became chief of the section in 1992. Under his steady hand, UCSF continues to be a world-renowned leader in the field of neuroradiology and head and neck imaging.

Dr. Dillon's many publications range across all areas of Neuroradiology. He has served as Senior Editor of the *American Journal of Neuroradiology* since 1996, fostering the quantity and quality of research publications in the field. His ability to make complex concepts simple and clear has created visiting professorships for him across the country and internationally.
